# County Council Report

**Diana Smith, County Councillor for Knaphill and West Woking**

The Season of Good Will did not extend to the Government's Revenue Support Grant for Surrey County Council, announced in December. A new way of calculating how much each Council gets from central funds over the next two years was announced. This would give Surrey £65 million, compared to £100 million in 2005/6, but for an additional £38 million of transitional funding this year, and £43 million next.

Council Tax brings in more than four times as much as the Revenue Support Grant, but even if the Council wanted to raise more money by raising taxes, it looks as if the Government will 'cap' rises at 5%.

The Executive is still looking for £50 million year-on-year economies, including staff cuts, which is painful for all concerned – and very expensive to implement, with extra pension and redundancy costs. Decisions will be made in January.

## New County Hall

One good question about proposed staff reductions is 'What happens to the empty desk-space?'. This has an impact on the Office Project, which is intended to get staff into good, modern accommodation. The New County Hall in Woking is part of the Office Project. The contract with Equion for New County Hall is not yet signed. As I write, current information is that a 'final' decision will be made in January (*a significant month, with decisions on efficiency savings as well*).

This has come as a surprise to those of us who thought the County's final decision had been taken last year.

Kingston University is lined up to buy the present County Hall, which is opposite their Penrhyn Road campus and will make a stately 'flagship' headquarters for them.

## That Government White Paper on Schools

At the end of November there was discussion in Full Council of the implications for Surrey of the new education White Paper. It contains lots of good ideas to do with meeting each individual child's needs, but also some that I felt were bad. Schools will be free to expand as they like, and have more freedom over admissions. There will be no more 'Community' schools. Andrew Crisp, the Executive Member for Schools and

Communities, considered me rather out of date in my views, and my motion to Council about this was defeated.

Meanwhile, officers concerned with Education have been gathering the views of primary school headteachers. Rating overall responses on a scale of one to five, from 'strongly disagree' to 'strongly agree', scores for intensive small group tuition for those falling behind were over four, with more 'personalisation' of education generally supported. There was no support for making it impossible for new Community schools to be set up and for the local authority to hold competitions between potential providers.

There will be more consultation, including with secondary and special school heads, in the spring term. Surrey will make its response after this.

## The Burning Issue

There's been a lot of alarm both about the proposal for an 'Energy from Waste' plant at Heather Farm on Horsell Common, and also the 'safeguarding' of the Martyrs Lane site with the implication that an incinerator for waste could be built there. Whatever the final judgment on this, the situation is better than it would have been fifteen years ago.

Emissions of dioxins and furans from new incinerators have been reduced by 99.8% since 1990. Even with the older incinerators, a Defra study examining reports of the health effects of incineration found no consistent evidence of increased risk of cancer or respiratory illness.

Germany incinerates virtually all its residual household waste. Its total dioxin emissions from all sixty six plants has fallen from 400 grams to less than half a gram since 1990. Other poisons and particulates are also filtered out far more efficiently.

Oddly enough, it can be argued that modern incinerators reduce pollution from burning in so far as the energy produced replaces energy from traditional power stations with much higher emissions.

Horsell Common is unlikely to become a poisoned wasteland – at least not as the result of these proposals. Which is not to say we shouldn't go on investigating a range of Energy-from-Waste options, not just incineration, and look very critically when detailed proposals are made.

## Police Report: Driving in Winter

This month I am going to focus on driving issues. I have liaised with our Casualty Reduction officer PC Richard Pheby. The following is information regarding winter driving and the other relates to a new scheme being set up on the police division.

### Winter Driving

If you have been watching the news or television lately you may have seen the Met Office warning of a cold winter this year. If you need to make a car journey in the freezing conditions then make sure you are prepared for it.

Suggestions by the Highway Agency and DfT (Department for Transport), endorsed by Woking's casualty reduction officer PC Richard Pheby, is to ensure you that have an emergency pack in your vehicle. Suggested contents are as follows:

- Ice scrapers and de-icer
- Torch
- Warm clothes and blanket
- Food and drink
- Boots
- First aid kit
- Battery jump leads
- Spade to dig your car out of the snow.

It is worth remembering the 'two second rule' when driving on wet roads, and certainly in the foggy conditions we have witnessed lately. Whilst driving along the road, mark a spot the car in front of you passes over and say to yourself "Only a fool breaks the two second rule". If you pass the point you marked before con-

cluding the sentence, you are too close!

If you use fog lights, then make sure you are not causing 'undue dazzle' to other road users. The Highway Code, rule 94 states: You must not:

- Use front or rear fog lights unless visibility is seriously reduced. You must switch them off when visibility improves to avoid dazzling other road users.

### Seriously reduced means 100 metres or less

When travelling in a queue of traffic, despite it being foggy, ask yourself. "Do I need my fog lights on?" If you can see the car behind or in front of you, and their lights, then turn your fog lights off, as you will be 'blinding' them with the high intensity of the light, and they could over power your brake lights!

### Community Speed Watch

Surrey Police is seeking volunteers to set up a new road safety scheme called "Community Speed Watch" in your area. The aim of the scheme is to reduce road casualties and collisions, provide public reassurance and to develop community spirit. Schemes have been on trial in Spelthorne, Elmbridge, Epsom and Ewell boroughs and will now be launched across the county.

At least six volunteers, who will contribute a minimum of an hour a week, are required to set up a speed watch and the police will produce a training package centred on the use of the equipment, health and safety issues and

advice on conflict situations. All relevant equipment will be provided.

The idea is for teams to work in pairs at an identified location selected by local communities in consultation with Surrey Police, provided they are within 30 mph and 40 mph limits. Members will record speeds of motorists in a log and offenders travelling at excess speeds will be identified from the data provided. They will receive a 'yellow' letter of advice highlighting the event and will be asked for their co-operation in the future. A maximum of two letters will be sent and repeat offenders will be targeted for enforcement where appropriate. It is anticipated vehicle speeds will reduce primarily due to the presence of highly visible monitors at the roadside.

# January in the garden

## FLOWERS & SHRUBS

**Roses:** If conditions are suitable, continue the planting of roses or prepare ground for planting in february or march.

**Herbacious plants:** Remove remaining fallen leaves from borders, dig over any vacant spaces between plants, clearing dead tops of non-shrubby plants. Where beds were prepared for planting sweet peas dress with hydrated lime.

**Propagation/cuttings:** If you have a heated greenhouse, sow begonias, gloxinias and streptocarpus. Plan spring planting bedding programme, in the comfort of your armchair.

## FRUIT & VEGETABLES

Continue to spray trees and bushes with a winter wash.

Carry on pruning if not already completed, collecting and burning clippings. Also, apply a nitrogenous fertiliser towards the end of the month. Plant rhubarb in a well manured soil and spread strawy manure over each crown. Do the same with established crowns, then cover some with a box to encourage an early crop. Plant shallots out in vegetable garden (which has been well manured).

## LAWNS

**New lawns:** Provided weather is favourable, continue to lay turf.

**Established Lawns:** Continue aeration treatment. Prepare top dressing for spring use.

**Hedges:** Plant deciduous hedges during mild weather.

# Culture in Woking

Cultural services provided by Woking Borough Council are 'good' and have promising prospects for improvement. That is the official verdict issued by the Audit Commission on Thursday 8 December.

Back in October, a range of the Council's cultural services, including the Borough's leisure and well-being facilities, arts, youth services and green spaces, all went under the Audit Commission's microscope. Following the week-long inspection, the Audit Commission reviewed its findings and the results show that the inspectors were impressed with the Council's service provision, including services provided both directly by the Council and in partnership with other organisations. In light of their investigations, they have been rewarded a two star rating (based on a scale of zero to three stars).

The inspectors found that Woking recognises cultural services as a priority, provides or supports a wide range of accessible activities, and receives high satisfaction ratings from its customers. Additionally, the inspectors found that the Council...

- offers a wide range of well-

used cultural services that deliver some positive outcomes and make a valuable contribution to raising the quality of life for local residents;

- has a good understanding of the needs of most of the community and addresses diversity issues through its cultural services;
- actively promotes its services and events.

The inspectors made two key recommendations, which were for the Council to strengthen its understanding of local needs by addressing gaps in consultation, and to develop a clear understanding of value for money in cultural services.

Cllr David Bittleston, Woking Borough Council's Portfolio Holder for Community Services, said: "The inspection has highlighted the range and quality of services the Council provides for residents. Although the report is generally very positive for the Borough, we are not complacent. The Commission has mirrored our own views where cultural services can do even better and staff will be working hard over the next few months to provide an even better service.

# Future development <sup>7</sup>

A preferred option report, which outlines plans for the future development of Woking Borough, will be the subject of a public consultation following a decision made recently by the Council's Executive. The report, which looks at future development in areas such as housing, retail, transport and community infrastructure, has been produced following two previous public consultations.

Most recently, the Council asked local people and key organisations to consider options for the future, based on different rates of development for the Borough.

Over 1000 people responded. The key components of the preferred option include:

- High density, mixed-use development in Woking Town Centre but no extension of the town centre boundary;
- No retail development outside existing centres;
- New housing in existing urban and residential areas with an overall target of 40% of new

homes to be "affordable housing";

- New development should make use of renewable and sustainable energy and help address climate change;
- No change to the Green Belt boundary;
- A tariff system to ensure new development makes a contribution to the provision of future infrastructure.

Talking about the preferred option, Cllr Graham Cundy, Woking Borough Council's Portfolio Holder for Planning Policy, said: "We believe that this preferred option could meet the economic and social needs of the local community and at the same time ensure that the development is sustainable and delivers a high quality environment with adequate infrastructure.
